The Car Fit is Now Offered at All our Car Seat Inspection Stations

CarFit is a community-based educational program that promotes continued safe driving and mobility among older drivers by focusing attention on safety, comfort and fit.

CarFit was created in 2006 in collaboration with AAA (American Automobile Association), AARP and the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA).

Northern NJ Safe Kids/Safe Communities now offers Car Fit Inspections at all of our Car Seat Inspection Stations.

Certified Car Fit Technicians will work with older drivers to improve their fit in their personal vehicle, promote meaningful dialog about driver safety and driving alternatives. A proper fit in one's vehicle can greatly increase not only the driver's safety but also the safety of others.

Each personalized inspection will review 12 key areas to ensure the driver's fit in their personal vehicle.

Below are three examples that underscore the importance of road safety to the CarFit program.

- 1. Knowing how to properly adjust one's mirrors can greatly minimize blind spots for drivers who may wish to change lanes.
- 2. Good foot positioning on the gas and brake pedals is important. If the driver is reaching with his or her toes to press on the pedals, it can cause fatigue in one's leg and slowed reaction times.
- Drivers run a risk of serious injury if they are sitting closer than 10 inches to the steering wheel.

Do you have a Bike Helmet?

The Summer of 2022 gave us a great opportunity to increase our Injury Prevention Programming.

We distributed nearly 1200 bike helmets to Adults and Children in our catchment area. Programming took place at schools, summer camps, libraries, street fairs, in our first aid/fire squads and on our bike paths within our region.

Cycling Safety along with the distribution of bike helmets were well received by all. Does your helmet fit correctly? Take the Helmet Fit Test and find out?

Ears: Make sure the straps form a 'V' under your ears when buckled. The straps should be a little tight but comfortable.



Mouth: Open your mouth as wide as you can. Does the helmet hug your head? If not, tighten the straps.

Now you're ready to roll!



There's a little-known risk to small children.

Inside small electronic devices may be very powerful coin-sized button batteries. When swallowed, these batteries can get stuck in the throat and cause severe burns or death.





- 1 Keep devices with button batteries out of reach if the battery compartments aren't secure, and lock away loose batteries.
- If a child swallows a button battery, go to the emergency room right away. Do not let the child eat or drink and do not induce vomiting.
- 3 Share this information with other parents and caregivers.

Coin lithium button batteries can cause severe injuries when swallowed.

Each year, there are about 3,200 calls to U.S. Poison Control Centers about a button battery being swallowed. Nearly 6 out of 10 of these cases are for children under the age of 6.



Many slim, sleek electronic devices have button battery compartments that are easy to open and most parents do not know there is a risk.



If a child swallows a button battery, symptoms may be similar to other illnesses, such as coughing, drooling, and discomfort. Kids can usually breathe with the battery in their throat, making the problem hard to spot.
